2022: THE YEAR IN REVIEW

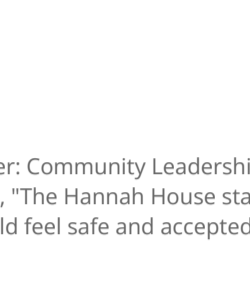
Success starts with the family.



Jobs, Education, and Entrepreneurship

Studies show that a solid family foundation—in which children complete a high school education, work full-time, and then get married before having children of their own—leads to success later in life. According to the Institute for Family Studies, 97 percent of Millennials following this path, in order, are not poor when they reach adulthood.*

Our goal is to strengthen Montana families, parents, children, and our most vulnerable individuals. We want to erase some of the barriers that stand between families and their future success, and prop people up to become the best possible versions of themselves.



Families and the Vulnerable

Our partners helped families and individuals flourish in 2022:

- Recovery centers across the state expanded to help people overcome their addictions, reconnect with their faith and families, and prepare for new jobs.
- School-based groups partnered with their communities to develop creative solutions to the teacher shortage and lack of affordable housing.
- Cultural organizations made theater, art, and music more accessible and reliable.
- STEM education was strengthened through a growing number of after-school technology programs.
- Career programs for adults not only helped individuals and their families, but are also addressing a skilled worker shortage.

- Rescue missions and other nonprofits expanded transitional housing, mental health services, and job training partnerships, to help vulnerable individuals and families become self-sufficient.
- Nonprofits serving veterans, active military personnel, and first responders increased their capacity, helping our heroes lead healthy, hopeful lives and pointing them to the resources they need to succeed.

In all, we contributed nearly \$11 million to our partners in 2022. We're proud of your work and the ways it strengthens families and vitalizes communities across Montana.

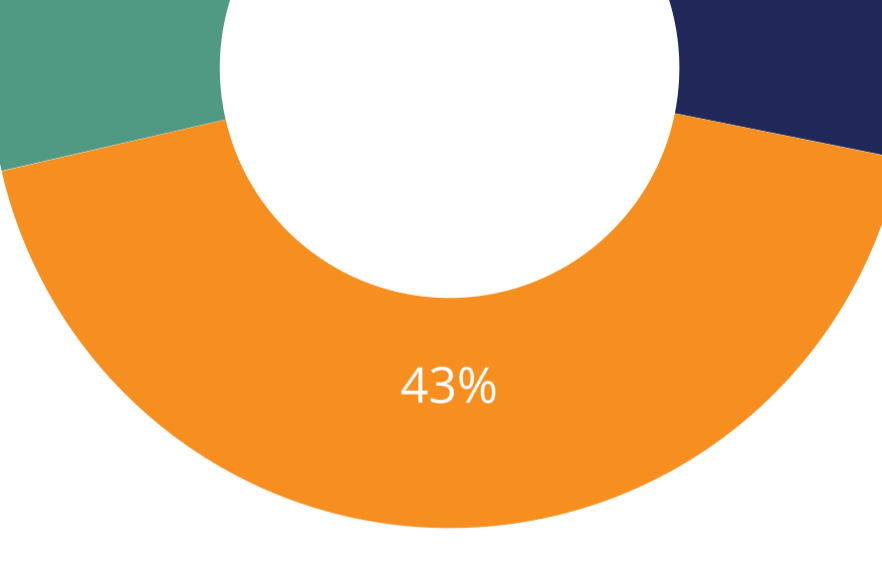

OUR WORK

Our Mission:

We support organizations that equip people to improve their lives in a sustainable way.

Our Vision:

To see Montana individuals and families flourish, spiritually and economically.

Our Focus:

1. Christian organizations engaged in outreach work, strengthening families, and helping the needy.
2. Organizations in Montana that work to improve education, support entrepreneurship, and create jobs.
3. Organizations that enhance the local community of Bozeman, Montana.

Code Girls United's Tech Trio and Coding Caribous teams earned the Spirit of Montana award in 2022. Code Girls teaches girls in grades 4-8 how to code, develop and present a business plan, and create an app to solve one of society's challenges. The program has expanded from the Flathead Valley to all areas of Montana and is now piloting a Tribal Coding Program.

- 5,007 Young people participating in youth programs
- 742 Youth in mentorship or small groups
- 1,040 At-risk youth being ministered to by a role model

- 3,926 Individuals in spiritual care classes
